Important Information

The "Hatching" of High School

- Students grow towards full independence (identity, responsibility)
- Students express their uniqueness interests, people, strengths, weaknesses
- Parents become coaches and consultants

How is High School Different from Elementary School

- 1. STUDENT LED initiative, independence, responsibility
- 2. Increasing workload, final exams, organization
- 3. Rotating classrooms
- 4. Expansion and exploration socially
- 5. Stress, peer and academic (grades count now and they can fail!)
- 6. Career planning

Parent Experience

How to help your child transition smoothly

- 1. Go to the orientation and tour the school
- 2. Discuss course selection with your student
- 3. Meet with teachers early and check-in regularly
- 4. Set up a study routine and environment
- 5. Explore extracurricular activities
- 6. Support your student to make social connections
- 7. Make parent connections yourself
- 8. Teach and encourage self-advocacy
- 9. Get some sleep!!!!

Options that may help

Summer school - TDSB, TCDSB

Reach Ahead - happens through summer school, night school, saturday school options. NSS prioritizes graded students in graded classes, therefore cannot guarantee reach ahead classes even with summer school/night school completion.

Private Credit options - can fill in gaps or help reach ahead to allow scheduling options

Fifth Year - allows further exploration of new directions or build lagging skills. Not all students are approved. See Guidance if you have any questions.

STEP, OYAP - bridge into job opportunities and apprenticeship programs

Points of perspective

- About 80% of students end up changing their major in post-secondary studies
- About 30% of students drop out after first year of post-secondary studies
- Our high school report cards are largely forgotten
- Everyone has a different timeline for their development, even within different skills in the same person! They may not peak in high school.
- "We do not build our lives on remediated weaknesses." Blow the embers of strengths into flame

Stay connected with your student

- Be curious ask questions gently but specifically
 - "Tell me more"
 - "What is it like...?"
- Offer suggestions and availability
 - "I wonder..."
 - "Let me know if you need help"
- ABOVE ALL, YOU ARE SAFE WITH ME
 - I love you no matter what
 - We are all growing all the time
 - Learning and achievement are not limited to academic environments
 - Spend time together that doesn't have to do with work

Things to watch for with your student

- Areas of self-motivation
- Strengths beyond academics
- Balance of "buckets" (connection/loved, productive/work, restorative/play)
- Falling behind in work
- Erratic class attendance (tardy, absence)
- Poor sleep
- Limited social engagement
- Stress, anxiety (escapism, argumentative, dishonesty)
- Seasons
